As a safety precaution, all children age 9 and under must be signed in and out of the program each day by those authorized at the time of registration. Fifteen minutes has been added to the beginning of each session to allow parents to drop off their children and proceed to their own sessions. Please pick up your children promptly at the end of each morning, afternoon and evening session. Parents will be charged babysitting fees if their children are not picked up 15 minutes after the close of each session.


